I bet this headline got your attention. It's true you are dying off, but not from old age as much as from lack of attention to providing your forwarding address when you move.

In the past year, our membership has changed quite remarkably. Unfortunately, it has gone down, not up. While we have added a few new members, we have lost more than we have gained.

Every newsletter has "Address Service Requested" printed on it. If someone moves and leaves a forwarding address with the Post Office, the newsletter will be sent on and I will be notified of the new address. However, this service only lasts for one year and is not foolproof.

Each time we mail out the newsletters, quarterly or thereabouts, I get several back that can't be forwarded for various reasons. The biggest ones are "moved, left no address" or "time expired unable to forward".

In addition, "Address Service Requested" is not free. Each time I get a notification it costs between \$.50 and \$.90 depending on the reason for the return.

The bottom line is, if we don't have your correct address and are unable to find one for you through our state reps or by using the internet (and we do try) your name will, regrettably, be removed from the active roster and from future newsletter mailing lists.

So if you want to continue to receive the newsletter and stay on the active roster, either tell the postmaster of your forwarding address or please take time to fill out the form on the back of the newsletter with any change of address, telephone number or e-mail if you have it.

IWO JIMA REVISITED


EDITORS NOTE: On occasion, when I need a story to finish up the newsletter, I go to the series of seven cruise books containing the history of EIGHT that I have on DVD. Last fall's newsletter showed a picture from the 8th NCB's WWII cruise book "Pieces of Eight". The Seabees of the 8th NCB landed on Iwo Jima 12 days after the first wave of Marines went ashore. The picture selected of EIGHT's camp was a vivid reminder of the tough conditions those brave men endured during the battle for Iwo Jima.

Shortly after I sent out the newsletter, I received an email from Lewis Unger, a member of the 8th NCB who landed with the battalion on Iwo Jima. He asked where I got the picture of the battalion encampment. He said he thought he took that picture. He also sent me an article of his recollection of "life on the rock" during the two months he spent there.

A series of pictures he sent are also published on the next three pages. Some of them he took, others, such as the raising of the flag on Mt. Suribachi were taken by others.

Dear Harry,

As a member of the WWII U. S. 8th. NCB, I enjoy your NMBC-8 Newsletter. I was very surprised to see a photo of the initial 8th. NCB bivouac area, which appears to be pretty much identical to a photo that I took. (See attachment) I also took many other photos on Iwo Jima.




The initial 8th Battalion bivouac area on Iwo Jima.

There was a road and airstrip up the slope to the right of the photo. The 2-man pup-tents covered excavations in the black volcanic ash. Many had filled sandbags with the black volcanic ash to support the sides prior to covering the excavations with the tents. When the monsoons came, the water from the adjacent landing strip and roadway came down the slope like a river. It flooded and completely filled all of the

excavations, completely ruining all clothing, bedding, and personal belongings. I guess that I'm the only one that wasn't affected. I was a MM 2/C–EO (Equipment operator) and some of our equipment included a few extra-heavy-duty utility type trailers approx. 6' x 9' in size with about 18" high sides.




General Kuribayshi's Cave system throughout the island

Each one had kits with extra heavy tarpaulins that could be assembled to resemble conestoga wagons. I (Continued on page 8)

assembled one in the center of the equipment compound, which was located to the far top and center of the photo, beyond the large tent, and I slept in it every night. I even ran an underground electrical wire and spliced into the shallow buried electrical line going to the mess tent and I had an electric light. With the heavy tarp and the ends lashed tight, one couldn't see the light from outside. After the flood, Walter Gill, from NYC, moved one of the other trailers to the rear of mine and we had a double length covered trailer or wagon. That was my home for the first 2 months on

Iwo Jima. The Mess Hall or tent was the large tent in the upper right as shown in the bivouac photo. There were long tables, but no benches. We stood up to eat until we finally moved to our permanent campsite and erected sleeping quarters and a more suitable mess hall. At night, dump trucks with sand bags around the insides of the beds and a 50 Cal. machine gun manned by 2 sentries on 4 hour shifts were strategically positioned around the perimeter of the area. As the Japanese approached carrying Molotov cocktails during the night, they would be mowed down and their flammable incinerators would ignite and their corpses would be charred by morning. Attached are a few photos that I took, but I have many more.

A FALLEN HERO IS HONORED

On Veteran's Day 2007, a fallen hero was honored by his fellow Seabees, family members and members of the public at a ceremony in Gardiner, WA. On that day, tribute was paid to a home town boy who grew up around Port Townsend, WA, a small Victorian port tucked away in the northwest corner of Washington State. His name is well known to all who have served in the Seabees since the Vietnam days. Marvin Shields, at the age of 25, gave his life on 10 June 1965 to save others in a battle at Dong Xoai, Republic of Vietnam. He was the first, and remains

the only Seabee to receive the Medal of Honor. He was also the first United States Navy sailor to receive the Medal of Honor for action in Vietnam.

For his unselfish gallantry above and beyond the call of duty, he was awarded the Medal of honor, posthumously,

by President Lyndon Baines Johnson at a ceremony at the White House on 13 September 1967. His wife Joan, was present to accept the Medal.

My wife and I live in Port Ludlow, WA, about 15 miles from Gardiner. We were out of town on Veteran's day last year, otherwise, we would have gone to the ceremony. I've had occasion to visit his grave site. The Gardiner cemetery is small and well maintained. All grave markers are set flush to the ground with the exception of Marvin's stone. It's made of polished black marble and stands above ground on a knoll. Shown below, it is a fitting tribute to a fallen hero from small town America.

A U.S. Navy color guard was part of a Veterans Day ceremony Monday at Gardiner Cemetery to honor Marvin G. Shields, the only Navy Seabee to receive the Medal of Honor. The 1958 graduate of Port Townsend High School died in Vietnam in 1965. *Port Townsend Leader*

Construction Mechanic 3rd Class Marvin G. Shields 1939-1965

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Although wounded when the compound of Detachment A342, 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne), 1st Special Forces, came under intense fire from an estimated reinforced Viet Cong regiment employing machine guns, heavy weapons and small arms, Shields continued to resupply his fellow Americans who needed ammunition and to return the enemy fire for a period of approximately 3 hours, at which time the Viet Cong launched a massive attack at close range with flame throwers, hand grenades and smallarms fire. Wounded a second time during this attack, Shields nevertheless assisted in carrying a more critically wounded man to safety, and then resumed firing at the enemy for 4 more hours. When the commander asked for a volunteer to accompany him in an attempt to knock out an enemy machine gun emplacement which was endangering the lives of all personnel in the compound because of the accuracy of its fire, Shields unhesitatingly volunteered for this extremely hazardous mission. Proceeding toward their objective with a 3.5-inch rocket launcher, they succeeded in destroying the enemy machine gun emplacement, thus undoubtedly saving the lives of many of their fellow servicemen in the compound. Shields was mortally wounded by hostile fire while returning to his defensive position. His heroic initiative and great personal valor in the face of intense enemy fire sustain and enhance the finest traditions of the U.S. Naval Service.


